The Ojai Library Friends Board is really a rather remarkable group of people. At present it consists of thirteen valley residents who reflect a range of age groups, interests. ethnicities. income levels- just like the Ojai Valley in general. All are volunteers with varying tenures with the OVLFF, ranging from 14 years to 2. It is a companionable group and, although there are occasional disagreements over Friends' business, our meetings are conducted genially and with great courtesy.

I have been privileged to serve as a member of this group since 2003 and acted as president since 2005. I have seen ideas come and go with many of them resulting in an addition to the number of ongoing services OVLFF provides and funds to and for our three valley libraries. The Friends have never shied away from discussing and, most often, underwriting new ideas that would promote literacy and participation in the library programs and offerings. The group is extraordinarily fortunate in that, for more than a decade,

we have never had to come to our support base seeking money. This good fortune is due, primarily, to two reasons: the funds donated to OVLFF by our supporting members and the revenue generated by our used bookstore-Twice-Sold Tales.

Twice-Sold Tales has been operating since 1996, when it was given a small place in the Ojai Library. After the purchase of the VanDyke Travel Agency in 2003 (that was the only time The Friends has done fundraising) the bookstore moved next door to the Ojai Library. Today it is operating in a newly renovated building with the addition of a downtown Ojai meeting venue. The recently-completed construction was, again, fully underwritten by the bookstore revenue and donations contributed by our supporting members, including a very large legacy gift.

This year I will be stepping down as president of The Friends. After twelve years it is past time for new leadership. I have been honored by the trust given me by OVLFF board members over

A CLOSE CALL IN THE BOOKSTORE

On Tuesday (September 12th) one of the bookstore clerks noticed that the ceiling in the bookstore was "bubbling," usually a sign that water was soaking through the ceiling board. We immediately contacted Supan Builders (they, you will recall, were the contractors on the rebuilding project), who called the company that installed the sprinkler system. The next morning a technician from that company arrived at TST to investigate. He cut a hole and found that the sprinkler head was leaking. What happened next triggered a series of quick actions.

those years and look forward, as a board member, to working with the new president in the year to come. The technician took a wrench and went to tighten the sprinkler head- without first shutting off the water (a 4 inch pressurized line). Sure enough, he broke the sprinkler head and water cascaded into the bookstore. By the time he had managed to find and shut the water valve there was water everywhere. We called Supan and he and a crew arrived almost immediately. They brought in several ShopVacs and vacuumed up the standing water. They then set up a number of large heaters and allowed them to run for nearly 36 hours. A consultation between Scott Supan and a representative from ServePro (the 'we fix it after a disaster' company) authorized the reopening of the store and meeting room after only 2 ½ days of having to be closed.



We lost a fair amount of books, the ceiling has been repaired and the woodwork that sat in water needs some attention... but we are back in operation. Whew!



LITTLE FREE LIBRARIES

Most Ojai Valley residents know that the OVLFF operates a brick and mortar bookstore, Twice-Sold Tales, but many residents are not aware of our outreach efforts, including several Little Free Libraries (LFL) in the community.

One of the LFLs that the OVLFF maintains is at Topa Topa Elementary School where students and neighbors can access the LFL on a 24/7 basis rather than being tied to specific days and hours of the school, bookstore and the public library. No library card or registration is required- the LFL motto is "Take a Book, Return a Book".

The international Little Free Library is a nonprofit organization (of which OVLFF is a member) that inspires a love of reading, builds community, and sparks creativity by fostering neighborhood book exchanges around the world. It maintains a country-wide, interactive map of LFLs that are registered at: https://littlefreelibrary.org/ourmap/.

Through Little Free Libraries, millions of books are exchanged each year, profoundly increasing access to books for readers of all ages and backgrounds. Little Free Libraries play an essential role providing access to books (and encouraging a love of reading!) in areas where books are scarce.


One of the most successful ways to improve the reading achievement of children is to increase their access to books, especially at home (McGill-Franzen & Allington, 2009). But according to the U.S. Department of Education, up to 61% of low-income families do not have any children's books in the home. "2/3 of students who cannot read proficiently by the end of 4th grade will end up in jail or on welfare. Over 70% of America's inmates cannot read above a 4th grade level" was reported in a research publication from the U.S. Department of Education, National Center for Education Statistics (2007). Another published research stated "Less than half of families read to their kindergarten-age children on a daily basis." (West et. al, 2000).

The OVLFF seeks to address the "book deserts" in our community in a cost efficient and effective manner. The LFLs will continue to grow and foster new generations of readers along with the traditional venues of brick and mortar libraries and bookstores.

ACCESS YOUR LIBRARY'S E-OFFERINGS FROM YOUR PHONE WITH LIBBY

One of the worst-kept secrets is that your local library often has way more to offer than a traditional book or two. E-books and audiobooks are as much a part of the catalogue these days.

And Libby is an app from Over-Drive — a company that works with libraries around the country to show off their e-books and audiobooks on offer. Users will need a valid library card from a participating system to use Libby. But if you meet those criteria, then the app makes it a snap to check out materials or place holds on the titles you want. You can read or listen to them right in the app.

It can also send your library books to a Kindle. For the kiddos, you can access graphic novels or picture books with read-along audio. Another bonus: You can sign into multiple library systems, if you hold multiple cards. The app will let you know when what you want is available. (Free, for iOS and Android devices and Windows 10)
