Volunteers.

Most people who come to the bookstore, bring their children to one of the afterschool homework programs, browse through the thousands of books in our twice-yearly open-air weekend book sales, or drop books into the book donation box do not realize that everything happens because of volunteers.

The truth is: there are no paid positions associated with The Ojai Library Friends and all of the programs we support. The Board of Directors, the folks who collect, sort and shelve donated books and the homework tutors in the three valley libraries- all are volunteers.

That's one of the wonderful aspects of Ojai- people give of their time and expertise to help others... volunteerism. The many non-profits that reside and operate in our valley could not function effectively without them, and OVLFF is no exception.

The term (and, I venture, the concept) of volunteering goes back over 450 years. Its etiology dates from 1590-1600; < French volontaire < Latin volunt \bar{a} rius voluntary, with -eer for French –aire, (www.etymonline.com), and it is generally defined as a person that actively takes on a task, responsibility, or project on his or her own accord without needing to be assigned, ordered, or told to do so; to choose to act in recognition of a need, with an attitude of social responsibility.

One of the aspects of Ojai that struck my wife and me as we visited the valley in the early 1980's was not just the friendliness of the people we met but the number who were actively involved as volunteers in the cultural and social-support systems of the valley. As educators, and volunteers ourselves, back in New York where we were living, we recognized the "special" contribution such individuals make to the cultural fabric of a community. SCHOOLINKS MOVES INTO THE NEW COMMUNITY ROOM Anne Shrage, Ojai Coordinator

Moving into the beautiful new Community Room attached to the Twice-Sold Tales used bookstore was exciting! On the first day, the kids helped set up the tables and chairs, Julie and Ron moved our blue cabinet with all our materials into the large closet and we set out the computers and printer. What fun! Our own private space- not having to ask library patrons to move and the only noise made was ours: students reading, asking questions and volunteers imparting wisdom. Fantastic natural light shining down on us from the skylight and the large window made it unnecessary to turn on the overhead lights.

For over 20 years, SchooLinks (found in the three valley libraries and fully funded by OVLFF) has been offering this very special program that welcomes students from Kindergarten to 12th grade, and sometimes beyond. Materials, resources, reference books and computers are available to support the needs of students. Volunteers, many of whom have been with the program since it began, are there to help students complete their assignments. The Ojai Valley Library Friends and Foundation continues to be very pleased to be able to provide this very important resource to the community.

Homework Center hours are Monday, Tuesday and Thursday from 3-5 PM, and from 1- 4 pm on Wednesday when school gets out early. The hours are 'tied' to the school calendar and hours may vary slightly at each location, so to confirm hours for the library near you and for additional information: Ojai- 646-9901, Meiners Oaks- 646-4804, and Oak View- 649-1523. Volunteers are always needed so if you like to work with children, help them with reading and writing and especially if you have math skills please call the library.

PRESSURE TO BAN BOOKS CONTINUES Excerpted from the 2016 American Libraries Association report

Regardless of format, digital or print, an ALA 2016 report shows that collections within school and public libraries continue to be challenged. A challenge is defined as a formal, written complaint filed with a library or school requesting that a book or other material be restricted or removed because of its content or appropriateness.

In July 2015, a Harris poll on attitudes about book banning and school libraries revealed that out of the 2,244 US adults who participated, the percentage (28 percent) who felt that certain books should be banned increased by more than half since the previous survey (18 percent) conducted in 2011. Book challenges recorded by ALA's Office for Intellectual Freedom (OIF) reveal that attempts to remove materials with diverse content are higher than ever before.

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MEETING ROOM A GREAT SUCCESS

The Friends began planning for the addition of a meeting room for the Ojai Library over five years ago, and it came to fruition as of the Grand Opening in January 2107. Our rationale was twofold: (a) the Ojai Library needed a venue, other than the library properwhere the large number of library-sponsored programs could meet, and (b) the Ojai community was in need of a meeting venue in downtown Ojai. Since its opening, the Library has made extensive use of the room between Monday - Thursday (SchooLinks, Children's programs, speakers, literary groups, and others), and such community organizations as The Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, The Ojai Women's Fund, The National Organization of Women, The Ojai Girls' Softball League, The Ojai Film Festival, and others have utilized the room. The Ojai Friends are both proud and happy to have been able to create this addition to our community's infrastructure. NEW LIBRARY BOOKMARKS

The OVLFF recently sponsored a collaboration with Matilija Junior High School Graphics Arts students to produce bookmarkers for the Ojai libraries to use as reading rewards prizes. Over 140 different designs were created and it was quite difficult deciding which to use. The project helped the students succeed by expanding their art portfolios, and the library patrons and summer reading participants will reap the benefits of new incentives with the bookmarkers as prizes.
